April 5, 1919.—At 2:30 with Hoffman, to the formal session at the Palais d'Egmont to commemorate the work done for the children. Vast crowds-and "la Brabançonne," and the people cheering when the King came in with the Queen and Prince Léopoldcheering, the nourishment of royal persons, as I remarked to Villalobar. The King had just flown back from Paris; he was in khaki.

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The Queen was lovely in white-and the big lad in khaki like his father. The cardinal was there in his red, and a row of dignitaries behind a red table.... The Cardinal made a speech-a poor onein which he attacked the Socialists. Afterward, another ceremony, in another part of the Palace, to which we walked, I with the Cardinal, chatting the while with him, across the sun-lit garden. There was a great jam, and after the singing of "la Brabançonne" and a speech by Jacquemain, Villiers and I escaped.
